

DECIDING TO DO AN OVERSEAS POST DOC

- HSRAANZ Mentoring scheme mentor
 - I wanted to specialise (not be generalist HE)
 - I wanted to specialise in a disease (rather than a method)
 - I didn't want to stay at UTS (avoid institutionalisation!)





ICE FELLOWSHIP

- 3 year post-doctoral fellowship cancer survivorship
 - Interdisciplinary (qualitative researcher, sociologist & health economist)
 - Capacity enhancement
- Fellowship money applied for by NCRI, then position advertised
- NCRI also advertised a position for a statistician on a separate project at same time


Biography

Alison returned to CHERE in May 2016 as a Chancellor's Postdoctoral Research Fellow. After completing her PhD on the costs of chemotherapy side effects at CHERE in 2013, she did a postdoctoral fellowship at the National Cancer Registry in Ireland. There, she worked on the costs of cancer survivorship, including lost productivity and patient preferences for cancer follow-up services. Prior to her PhD, Alison worked in cancer research at the National Breast and Ovarian Cancer Centre (now Cancer Australia) and the NHMRC Clinical Trials Centre at the University of Sydney.

Alison's current work examines some of the societal costs of cancer. This includes estimating cancer related productivity losses in Australia,





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

- altmetrics are non-traditional metrics proposed as an alternative to more traditional citation impact metrics, such as impact factor and h-index
- Sourced from social media twitter, Instagram, blogs etc (blue is twitter – usually predominant)

 New metrics like this highlight the importance of attribution = ORCID

ORCID



- Provides a persistent digital identifier that distinguishes you from every other researcher
- Being integrated throughout the research timeline, from grants to publication


 Means that all these automated & optional tracking systems can accurately associate your work to you

- Publons is a website and free service for researchers to share, discuss and receive credit for peer review and editing of academic publications
- Forward the 'thankyou' email that you get from the journal to <u>reviews@publons.com</u> and it gets added to your account
- Get credit for the otherwise unpaid work of reviewing & assign credit transparently

- All are social networking sites, targeting at business (LinkedIn) or research (Research Gate, Academia.edu)
- LinkedIn connecting with people & sharing research (summaries)
- ResearchGate connecting with people & sharing papers
- Academia.edu connecting with people, sharing papers, monitor impact

LINKED IN VS RESEARCH GATE VS ACADEMIA.EDU

- I have an account for all of them, but...
 - I check LinkedIn every week (& share research summaries)
 - I check Research Gate every month (& share full texts)
 - I check Academia.edu every 3 months (but don't do much)

- Consider setting up profiles, but redirecting all information to one spot (eg my website)
- Don't connect with people you don't know, think about connecting with friends

I am a health economist interested in the various costs of cancer. My research aims to use health services research and health economics to improve cancer care by providing relevant, reliable information for decision making.

Currently based at the Centre for Health Economics Research and Evaluation (CHERE) at UTS, I am working in the areas of productivity loss and patient preferences. This work extends the research I did on the economics of cancer survivorship at the National Cancer Registry in Ireland. I completed my PhD on the costs of chemotherapy side effects at CHERE in 2013, before which I worked in cancer clinical trials and health services research. My original training was in occupational therapy, and I remain interested in rehabilitation research. I also have a keen interest in early career researcher development, communicating research to the public, and the use of social media in research.

As well as an academic, I am an entrepreneur with a love of chocolate. In 2016 I co-founded Bean Bar You, Australia's first independent bean-to-bar chocolate subscription service, with my husband. The experience of building a business from scratch has been an opportunity to see many economic principals in practice, as well as learning many new skills and expanding my networks.

- Figshare is an online digital repository where researchers can preserve and share their research outputs, including figures, datasets, images, and videos

- Gives you one place to keep track of everything – point all other things there
- Easy to set up eg WordPress, SquareSpace
- Blogging is hard, but develops skills in summarising. Time & confidence are the biggest factors.
- Consider contributing to curated blogs (ie let someone else do the hard work!)



- Be intimidated

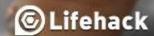
